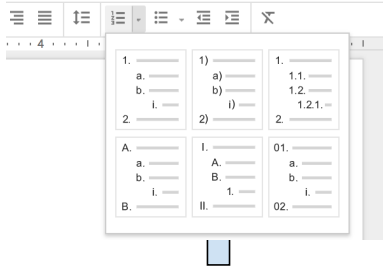


How to create an outline in a Google doc



1. Choose the number tool on the toolbar.
2. Select the bottom middle option for outline format using roman numerals.
3. Use the basic format provided below to guide you.

How to Write a Comparative Analysis

Over the course of your academic career, you will be asked to write essays in which you compare and contrast two things: two characters, two texts, two events, etc. This type of paper lends itself to two basic options in organization.

- Text-by-text, where you discuss all of A and then all of B
- Point-by-Point, you alternate points about A with comparable points about B

Regardless of whether you choose a text-by-text or a point-by-point approach, the introduction of a comparative analysis essay should provide context for the comparison (see explanation below.)

How to approach your INTRODUCTION:

- **Provide a Frame of Reference** - The frame of reference is the context within you place each of the things you plan to compare/contrast. It may be anything from an idea to a theme, a problem, or a question.
- **Grounds for Comparison** - Assert your rationale for the comparison of A and B.
- **Thesis** - Your thesis will need to address both A and B in relation to one another. This is the heart of the comparative analysis essay, and it will serve as the argument you intend to prove. Your introduction should include your frame of reference, grounds for comparison, and then end with your thesis.
